# 1. Title of the Practice

# **Establishment of the Garden of Medicinal Plants and Campus Plantation**

### 2. Goal

A medicinal plant garden reflects the long-standing tradition of conserving and using plants and plant products for health care and therapeutic applications. There is an increasing demand for medicinal plants but the traditions and culture associated with them are fading. Making a medicinal garden is an opportunity to grow herbs for use, along with spreading the knowledge of their importance and traditional uses, and saving plants that are threatened. That is why the college has established the medicinal garden for the dual purpose of spreading the knowledge and conserving the threatened medicinal plants of the region. Along with the medicinal plants, some of the commercial plants were selected for the campus plantation.

## 3. The Context

In establishing a medicinal garden, the first thing that needs to be sorted out is the type and number of plants that are to be included. For this the faculty members of the Botany Department of the college were requested to prepare a list of indigenous plant species with medicinal importance and the environment required for their growth.

# 4. The Practice

Some of the rare and medicinally important plants were planted and maintained in the garden. These includes *Colocasia esculenta*, *Alocasia macrorrhiza*, *Desmodium laxifolium*, *Thunbergia coccinea*, *Azadirachta indica*, *Ocimum sanctum*, *Rubia cordifolia*, *Vinca rosea*, *Rumex nepalensis*, *Sida rhombifolia*, *Chenopodium album*, *Agathoda vesica*, *Leucas linifolia*, *Momordica dioica*, *Rauvolfia tetraphylla*, *Centella asiatica*, *Mentha piperita*, *Justicia adhatoda*, *Costus specious*, *Leucas plukenetii*, along with some of the economically important plant species such as *Cymbopogon sp.*, *Saraca asoca* etc. The garden is also witnessed with the presence of *Nepenthesis khasiana*, an endangered insectivorous plant

endemic to Khasi Hills only. A herbarium of the medicinal plants is also maintained by the

Botany Department of the college.

The college also organized a plantation drive where a large number of timber-yielding

plant species were planted in the open spaces within the college campus. The college has also

taken steps to maintain the greenery in the vicinity of the college.

5. Evidence of Success

The existence of a medicinal garden inside the college premise has marked out to be a

source of information and awareness among the students as well as among the residence of

the locality. The garden is frequently visited by college students, students from nearby school

and local people. The names and the medicinal value of the plant species is clearly displayed

along with other descriptions, which helps observer to acquire knowledge about the plants.

Some of the rare and threatened plant species has also been maintained in the garden, which

could provide a platform for their conservation. The garden also provides raw materials for

B.Sc. projects for many students. The existence and maintenance of the garden was

appreciated by many visitors including Head of the Botany Department, GU.

6. Problems encountered and Resource required

The major problems encountered in the establishment and maintenance of the

medicinal garden are- a) The availability of the saplings and propagules of the medicinal

plants has been a major problem. b) The adaptation of the introduced plants required special

care and favourable conditions to be maintained. c) Lack of suitable tissue culture facilities is

a problem for the multiplication of saplings. A suitable culture facility would allow to culture

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and increase the number of propagules of some rare and threatened plant species.

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# Practice -II

# 1. Title of the practice

Implementation of cashless transaction in all financial matters of the college.

#### 2. Goal:

The aim of this practice is to make a cashless society where cash is replaced by its digital equivalent. The exchange of legal tender is done in electronic digital form.

#### 3. The context:

Such a concept is important because the world is experiencing a rapid and increasing use of digital methods of recording, managing, and exchanging money in commerce, investment and daily life in many parts of the world, and transaction which would historically have been undertaken with cash is often now undertaken electronically

#### 4. The Practice:

The policy of not adopting the cash in any transaction is widely circulated amongst the students and guardian. The massage is transferred to students through College news letter, college prospectus and even admission form is used to spread the massage. Talk is arranged for the students on the topics of cashless transaction which is address by important resource persons. The office staff is trained on the use of POS (Point of Sale) machine. The local bank personals are invited to help the college authority in the execution of the Plan.

#### 5. Evidence of success:

The effort made by all the stakeholders, the plan of electronic transfer of money is accepted. At present, the campus of M.C.College, Barpeta is 100 percent cashless.

This practice helps students to understand the importance of cashless economy. The students have used Debit Card for making payment of Annual fees, Examination fees etc. The process implemented for all semesters is completed smoothly without any anomalies. The students has extended full cooperation in this regards and expressed satisfaction at the successful completion of the cashless transaction.

## 6. Problems Encountered:

Initially most of the students did not accept cashless transaction. Even guardian of the students opposed the cashless system introduced by college authority. Because of the vehement opposition raised from the students, it couldn't be implemented in last year. However relentless effort made by the college authority, the student community has finally accepted the digital mode of transfer of money.
